October 19: Full Circle by Charles Mee

In playwright Charles Mee's view there is no such thing as an original play. He says: "I grew up with people telling me – I think rightly – that the greatest plays in the western world were written by Shakespeare, and, of course, by the Greeks. But when I started writing plays, people were trying to write plays like Ibsen and Eugene O'Neill and Arthur Miller. And I thought: If the Greeks and Shakespeare were the greatest playwrights, why aren't we all trying to write plays the way they did?" In creating *Full Circle*—Footlights' next play for discussion – Mee notes that Bertolt Brecht's *The Caucasian Chalk Circle* was taken from a play by the German dramatist Klabund, on which Brecht had served as dramaturg in 1926; and Klabund had taken his play from an earlier Chinese work.

Charles Mee has written several dozen plays, and books for both children and adults. His autobiography, *A Nearly Normal Life*, recounts his barely surviving spinal polio as a teenager, an experience which may possibly have helped shape his dark and fragmentary writing style. He is an historian, a screenwriter, a director, and has edited the *Horizon* magazine of the arts. Mee now teaches playwriting at Columbia University. He has always been a political activist, and was once chairman of a grassroots organization calling for the impeachment of Richard Nixon.

Mee is the first and only playwright ever to make his full body of theater works available on the internet. *Full Circle* is online at http://www.charlesmee.org/html/fullcircle.html. A Very Brief History of the Berlin Wall

Full Circle is set in Berlin in 1989, as the Wall comes down. At the end of WWII, Germany was divided into four zones, each one to be controlled by one of the Allied forces: The United States, France, Britain, and the Soviet Union. The capital Berlin was also divided into four parts, although the city actually was entirely within the Soviet sector. Three of the four zones – American, French, British – soon merged, and rebuilding the country and its economy

began. The Soviet-controlled section, East Germany, became part of the Eastern Bloc of countries, separated from Western Europe by the so-called Iron Curtain. Controlling emigration and brain drain from the East to the more prosperous West soon became a problem for the Soviets, and especially in Berlin which had provided the easiest escape route after the border was closed. Their solution: The Berlin Wall, which was built in 1961. It completely encircled West Berlin, isolating it from East Berlin and the rest of East Germany. The Wall remained in place for a quarter of a century, until 1989, when it came down, paving the way for the reunification of Germany. Although some Western European leaders, notably then British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, were very much opposed to the reunification (and possibly the rearming) of Germany, the United States was in favor of it, and Ronald Reagan made history with his "Mr. Gorbachev, tear down this wall" speech.

Perhaps the custody battle in *Full Circle* is a metaphor for the struggle to find a *third way*-something between capitalism and communism-for a reunited Germany to pursue.

We'll meet at **Alfio's** on **Monday, October 19**. Our speaker will be **Augie Praley**, a member of the New Play Development team at Woolly Mammoth Theater Company. Augie is a University of Chicago graduate, with a degree in Theater and Performance Studies. He is a playwright (he has written five plays – and is hard at work on #6), a director, a poet, and a dramaturg, and has an especial knowledge of, and fondness for, Charles Mee and Mee's plays.
