Footlights to Discuss Horton Foote's *The Trip to Bountiful* on Thursday, March 11

Jack Sbarbori and **Stephanie Mumford**, co-founders of Quotidian Theatre Company, will be our guest speakers as we explore playwright Horton Foote's most famous work, *The Trip to Bountiful*. Actress **Jane Squier Bruns** who will play Carrie Watts in Quotidian's upcoming production will join them.

Jack is well known to our members not only as a favorite speaker but also for the excellent work his Quotidian Theatre does, for the exquisite sets he designs for the productions, and of course for those striking Tommy Hilfiger shirts he wears. (He swears this is his only indulgence.)

Here are a few things you may not know about Jack: He and Quotidian co-founder/actress Stephanie Mumford have been married for 23 years; after a brief fling as a Fine Arts Major in college he got a degree in Russian from Columbia University, and has done several modern translations of Chekhov's plays – *Three Sisters*, *Uncle Vanya*, *The Cherry* Orchard – which have been performed locally; he became interested in black vocal groups (and especially doo-wop) when he worked in a record shop as a teenager, is now considered an authority on them, and has written articles about, and record liners for, many of these groups; retired from a government job, in his spare time he haunts flea markets and garage sales for authentic items for his sets and is a dedicated e-Bay customer; and although the name Sbarbori sounds Eastern European to some people, his background is pure Italian and the family originally came from the Lombardy region.

Jack says future plays for Quotidian may include Conor McPhersons's *The Seafarer*, Athol Fugard's *Master Harold and the Boys*, Brian Friel's *Afterplay*, and a one-act Chekhov play which has never been seen in this area.

Footlights will meet at **Casa Fiesta**, **Thursday**, **March 11**, for a buffet dinner and our discussion. Dinner is at 6:30 and discussion begins at 7:30. If you prefer, you may come for the discussion only. Casa Fiesta is at 4910 Wisconsin Avenue, halfway between the Tenleytown and Friendship Heights metro stops on the red line. In April: Neil LaBute's Reasons to Be Pretty

Are we obsessed with physical beauty? Playwright Neil LaBute believes we may be.

In *The Shape of Things*, Holly Twyford turns a nerdy museum security guard into a heartthrob, even as she destroys his life as he knew it. He falls in love with her, but eventually discovers that his make-over actually has been just a thesis project for her MFA degree, which she has now completed, and that she has no personal interest in him whatever.

In Fat Pig, plus-sized actress Kate Debelack finds her soul mate but they do not live happily ever after, because he simply cannot handle the constant ribbing he gets from friends and office mates over the size of his lover and best friend. They part, in tears.

Now Studio Theatre brings us the third play in this "beauty trilogy" – *Reasons to Be Pretty*, in which an unlucky guy says his girlfriend's face is "regular-looking" rather than "beautiful" ... and lives to regret his poor choice of words.

Neil LaBute is a playwright (20 plays), screenwriter and director, teacher, and short story writer. He joined the Morman Church while he was in college, but was asked to leave (and did) because of his writings, although he has always insisted he writes from his imagination and not his life, and says none of his characters is based on anyone he knows or has ever known. Although LaBute's plays and movies can be extremely dark and bitter, friends insist he is a nice man in person.

Footlights will meet in April - date and location to be announced - to discuss *Reasons to Be Pretty*. Our guest speaker will be director **David Muse**.

David is the Associate Artistic Director at Shakespeare Theatre, and currently directs *Henry V* which is running in repertory with *Richard II*. He directed the all-male *Romeo and Juliet*, as well as *Julius Caesar*, and *Pericles* for the

Carter Barron Free-for-All. He has also worked at Arena Stage (*Frankie and Johnny in the Claire de Lune*), Theatre Alliance (*The Bluest Eye*), and Studio Theatre (*Frozen*) among others.

He is a graduate of Yale University and Yale School of Drama. He says his favorite Shakespeare villain is Iago. Someday he hopes to direct some O'Neill and Beckett plays. Meanwhile, he is dividing his time between Shakespeare Theatre and Studio where he is hard at work on *Reasons to Be Pretty*, which opens at Studio on March 24.
