Footlights to Discuss Neil LaBute's Resons to Be Pretty on Wednesday, April 14

A blown-up photo of a praying mantis is on the cover of the Studio Theatre playbill for **Neil LaBute**'s play. The best known "habit" of the female of this species is to bite off the head of the male copulating with her. And so begins our play.

But, humans do it. The female of the species also uses her jaws. But to make furious bursts of a seemingly never-ending cursing-out of a clueless, defensive live-in boyfriend.

This is LaBute's last take in his trilogy on the American pursuit of prettiness. No one is left unmarked, unhurt, unchanged. Perhaps the clueless, defensive ex-live-in boyfriend (our hero) learns something from having his head bitten off – perhaps. At the very least he gives us the great satisfaction of getting even with his arrogant, muscular, good-with-the women, so-called best friend.

Reasons to Be Pretty was the first of LaBute's plays to be staged on Broadway, to generally good reviews a year ago. Ben Brantley, the New York Times critic, called it a "wonderfully acted production" that might be "the sentimental sleeper of a season...." He also said "Mr. LaBute is writing some of the freshest and most illuminating American dialogue to be heard anywhere these days."

An aimless young man who has done some community college work, Greg reads more books than people. He gets our deep sympathy because he is a decent man who wants to do the right thing once he seems to understand what he wants and what Steph, his ex-girlfriend, wants. She, too, has do some traveling to go from fury to understanding what she wants and being unsure, apparently, who might help her meet her needs. These are some of the major reasons that LaBute has called *Reasons to Be Pretty*, "the first coming-of-age story I've written."

But not all reviewers were buying that story line. Elisabeth Vincentelli of the New York Post said in her review: "Setting the action against a working-class backdrop was a potentially daring move, but as with so many things in the show, LaBute hedged his bets: Greg's predilection for Poe and Hawthorne suggests his higher aspirations, but it's also an underhanded way to ensure a theater audience will be sympathetic to his plight."

Our guest will be **Sarah Wallace**, dramaturg and associate literary manager of Studio, back by popular demand. She spoke to us a year ago about the absorbing *Rock 'n' Roll* by Tom Stoppard, and last Fall about the puzzling *Moonlight* by Harold Pinter. Her patience, energy and knowledge

helped us focus our thoughts on these plays and we can count on more of that April 14.

We have been in touch with **David Muse**, director of *Reasons to Be Pretty*, and he hopes he can come to our dinner-discussion. He cannot be certain because he will be auditioning actors for a new project. He came to *Reasons* right on the heels of an acclaimed version of *Henry V* at the Shakespeare Theater Company. He is the associate artistic director there, having directed six productions for the company. This is his fourth production at Studio, which have earned 10 Helen Hayes Awards and won four. He has done plays at Arena Stage and in New York.

Jerry Stilkind will moderate our discussion.
