September 16: Footlights to Discuss *The Two-Character Play* by Tennessee Williams

The Two-Character Play by Tennessee Williams went through two earlier versions before arriving at the final 1976 version. It is one of his most personal works; Williams spent almost ten years writing and rewriting it. In the 1960s Tennessee Williams underwent rejection by critics and scant support from audiences for his new plays. As early as 1983, academic writers began to recognize that The Two-Character Play was significant. In recent years, several revivals of the play met with favorable critical and audience reaction.

The two characters, Felice and Clare, are brother and sister actors on tour who perform a play within a play that reflects a family tragedy, their precarious mental health, and the economic failure of their acting troupe. The reality of their situation is quite stark. Their father murdered their mother and then killed himself in their presence. The weapon is an artifact of the play. Felice and Clare and the characters they play both undergo changes in their emotions and in their mental clarity about the situation that they are facing. They both live in dread of confinement in a state home and it seems they are running out of options to evade this fate.

Wikipedia describes the play as a "marked departure from the naturalism of [Williams] classics." About naturalism Wikipedia defines it as "a literary movement taking place from the 1880s to 1940s that used detailed realism to suggest that social conditions, heredity, and environment had inescapable force in shaping human character." Do Footlights readers of the play agree with the Wikipedia contention?

The play follows what takes place before, during and after a performance of the play within the play. These twists and turns make the play challenging for directors and actors.

Joining us to discuss their upcoming production of the play at Spooky Action Theater will be **Richard Henrich**, the artistic director of the theater and the two actors, **Lee Mikeska Gardner** and **David Bryan Jackson**. Lee is one of our most appreciated guests; most recently she spoke with us as the director of Allyson Currin's *Caesar and Dada*. David spoke with us before in our meeting to discuss Stoppard's *Jumpers*. We have here three stalwarts of the Washington theater scene — each with long résumés. With such talent we should have a great discussion and also look forward to seeing the Spooky

Action production of *The Two-Character Play*.
