## October 28: Footlights to Discuss Eugene O'Neill's The Iceman Cometh

Eugene O'Neill: One of America's greatest playwrights, in the tradition of Ibsen, Chekhov, and Strindberg, or one of the most overrated, whose plays are all too long and too tedious? Join Footlights on October 28 for dinner and a discussion and share your thoughts!

Eugene Gladstone O'Neill was born in New York City in 1888, in a room in a Times Square hotel (now a Starbucks), the son of an Irish immigrant actor. He attended private schools with limited academic success, and spent one year at Princeton but was expelled for possibly – tossing a beer bottle through the window of the then-college professor Woodrow Wilson. Wilson went on to become President of the United States while O'Neill spent several years at sea, an experience which later served as background for several plays, among them Beyond the Horizon which Footlights discussed in December 2010. He suffered from alcoholism and depression, attempted suicide, and was a derelict on the waterfronts of Buenos Aires, Liverpool, and New York City. He ended up in a sanitarium with tuberculosis and it was there that he began to write plays, which became a life's work. He wrote 30 long plays and 20 shorter ones, won four Pulitzer Prizes for drama, and is the only American playwright ever to win a Nobel Prize for Literature. He married and divorced several times and eventually disowned both sons for various reasons and also his daughter Oona (for marrying Charlie Chaplin). He died in 1953 in a hotel room in Boston.

The Iceman Cometh (1939 - first performed in 1946) is set in a shabby bar-hotel in New York City in 1912, where the 'regulars' eagerly await the twice yearly visit from traveling salesman Theodore 'Hickey' Hickman, who always comes with good dirty jokes and money to buy drinks for everyone. This time, however, he arrives with big plans to free his friends from both alcohol and their 'pipe dreams' only to find that life without illusions may be no life at all. Jason Robards, James Earl Jones, and, more recently, Kevin Spacey have all had major theatrical success with the play. Lee Marvin starred in the 1947 film.

Quotidian Theatre Company will present The Iceman Cometh from October 25-November 24. Footlights is happy to welcome four speakers from the production to our discussion: Director Michael Avolio, Artistic Advisor Bill Largess, and actors Steve LaRocque and Frank Britton. Mary Ann Wren will moderate our discussion.

We will meet on Monday, October 28, at Alfio's Trattoria, 4515 Willard Avenue, Chevy Chase, Maryland, on the ground floor of the Willoughby Apartments, a short walk from the north entrance of the Friendship Heights metro stop on the red line. Street parking is limited if you drive, but valet parking is free at Alfio's. Dinner is at 6:30; the discussion begins at 7:30 and ends at 9.

The all-inclusive cost for dinner and discussion is \$20. Dinner is a green salad, choice among six entrées, and spaghetti, green beans, bread and butter, ice cream, and tea or coffee. Alfio's salad bar may be substituted for the entrée if you wish. Cash or check – no credit cards, please. Wine, beer, and cocktails are available from the bar. You may come for the discussion only, for just \$5.
