October 20: Footlights Dinner-Discussion

August Wilson—The Man, the Messages, the Legacy April 27- 1945- October 2, 2005

It's been ten years since August Wilson's death. He left a legacy of ten plays in his "Pittsburgh cycle," that stand at the pinnacle of American Theater. There is always an August Wilson production happening Somewhere—there were four and counting last year in the Washington, D.C. metro area. His Pulitzer Prize winning Fences opens at Everyman in October and is called "one of the most groundbreaking plays of the 20th century." His work is honored and celebrated in festivals and events worldwide, including an August Wilson Monolog Competition in New York that brings talented young people into his canon of literature, to live on.

What is it about his plays that instills such passion in actors and artists who perform his work? Wilson's textual phrasing and cadence with words spill across the page like jazzy riffs that over time become embedded in our hearts and souls. His use of African symbolism and spirituality throughout his scripts is legendary and touch us to the core.

Join our guests as we explore what makes him and his passages so endearing and powerful. Many of us have seen **KenYatta Rogers** take on Wilson's work with ferocious intensity, most recently in *King Hedley II* at Arena Stage earlier this year. Rogers was recently named the Maryland Professor of the Year by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE). **Michelle Rogers**, yes a husband and wife theatrical dynamic duo, has also performed in Wilson's productions and will offer her views on his approach to his female characters.

It's been ten years since the historic and groundbreaking two-day symposium "Situating August Wilson" was held at Howard, organized and coordinated by **Dr. Sandra G. Shannon**, just six months before his death. She knew and talked with Wilson and will provide her insights on his life work and mission. Dr. Shannon was also a consultant on the 2015 PBS American Masters documentary, *The Ground On Which I Stand*, described as the "first in-depth documentary on the life, work and cultural impact of the great playwright and visionary."

Sandra is a Full Professor of African American Literature, specializing in Dramatic Literature and Criticism at Howard, is President of the Black Theater Network, and has a warm place in her heart for Footlight discussions.

Join us for this reflective, retrospective journey to explore the themes, social issues, and societal commentary in Wilson's work. No one does it like August Wilson, and we look forward to seeing how and why. **Debbie Jackson** is facilitating and is dedicating the session to the memory of **Beatrice Rouse** who organized the Wilson Legacy discussion in 2006.

Reserve now for Footlight's dinner-discussion on **Tuesday**, **October 20** at Alfio's, located at 4515 Willard Avenue, Chevy Chase, MD, on the ground floor of the Willoughby Apartments – a short walk from the north entrance of the Friendship Heights metro stop on the red line.
