Footlights to discuss August Wilson's Gem of the Ocean on Thursday, November 1

After several of his plays were successfully produced, **August Wilson** noted that he was "onto something" and consciously started developing what's known as the "Pittsburgh Cycle," a play representing each decade of the 1900s. **Gem of the Ocean** is set in 1904 but was written nearly last, years after the works that brought Wilson to prominence with a Tony Award, two Pulitzers and national acclaim. The historical inferences, references, and messages found in **Gem of the Ocean** are scattered throughout his plays—as such, the play is foundational, though not as frequently produced as his others. A crucial point is that people need to come to grips with their past and history to move forward.

The mysteriously aged and ancient Aunt Ester is referenced in several of Wilson's works and she is actually seen only in Gem where she is already revered for her ancient wisdom and mystical powers. A stranger interestingly named "Citizen" seeks her out pleading to "cleanse his soul" for an infraction he committed. Through Aunt Ester we learn that the passage to forgiveness and healing requires looking back to move forward. To Wilson, the foundational rootlessness of Black people comes from being torn away from their rich African heritage, stripped of their legacy, and thus stuck and shackled mentally and emotionally long after the physical chains have been removed. Redemption is only possible when "Citizen" - obviously a metaphor for us all – can acknowledge the shimmering bones of the enslaved along the Middle Passage to move forward.

Come explore the rich tapestry of Wilson's haunting images and elegant language with a return visit by **Ryan Rilette**, Round House Theatre artistic director, and welcome **Timothy Douglas**, director, for his first Footlights experience. Debbie Jackson will moderate. Debbie first interviewed Timothy back in the "early days" and recalls him saying, "...beware of

calling on the ancestors lightly, because they will show up!" Judging from his remarkable career directing Wilson and other plays throughout the country, and his recent engaging vocal passages in Round House's *Small Mouth Sounds*, the ancestors have had full reign in Douglas' life. Come see how he and the Round House designers take on this formative Wilson production.

Location. We will meet at **Alfio's La Trattoria**, located at 4515 Willard Avenue, Chevy Chase, MD, on the ground floor of the Willoughby Apartments – a short walk from the north entrance of the Friendship Heights metro stop on the red line. Street parking is limited, but valet parking is available at Alfio's. Dinner is at 6:30, the discussion begins at 7:30 and ends by 9.
