Footlights to discuss Anat Gov's Oh, God on Monday, December 3

Please join us for dinner and discussion of *Oh, God* by Israeli playwright **Anat Gov**.

There's this old joke, God walks into a bar and.... No, this time God walks into a psychotherapist's office and he is depressed, suicidal. He gave people the power to decide their own lives and they have, in his name, happily killed each other over the years and destroyed much of the land, water and sky he created for their profit and enjoyment. Also, people talk more about Jesus, Mohamed and Moses than him. "I'm a big nothing," he tells the therapist. He wonders whether he should simply kill himself.

The psychotherapist is Ella, a single mother of an autistic teenager. If he were to kill himself, he would be destroying the world, she points out. He cannot do that because he promised Noah some time ago that he would not ever again kill off everybody and everything. God conceded the point, but not without revealing that Noah was a drunkard.

Ella is divorced, raising a son who does not speak, is a specialist in children's learning disabilities and has lost much faith in religion. Of course, she cannot at first believe it really is God, who insists that he wants only one session with her. But, she is a professional and soon there is rueful laughter and hurtful truths exchanged in her comfortable home office. A huge problem, of course, is that he is an orphan, he cannot blame parents for his problems.

Why did he choose her as his confidant? We'll find out in the course of this play on the ever present question of whether a secular, troubled people can believe in the traditional God.

Anat Gov, an Israeli playwright and television writer, composed the play in 2008. It went on tour for several years as a staged reading in English to college campuses in this country. It has had full stage performances the last few years and this run will be the first in our area.

Our speaker will be **Serge Seiden**, managing director and producer of Mosaic Theater Company. **Ari Roth**, the founder and artistic director of Mosaic, may also be able to join us. Both have often talked to us. Jerry Stilkind will moderate our discussion.

Oh, God is directed by Michael Bloom, and features Mitchell Hébert as God and Kimberly Schraf as Ella. Performances are at the Atlas Performing Arts Center, Lang Theatre, from December 12 through January 13, 2019.

Location. We will meet at **Alfio's La Trattoria**, located at 4515 Willard Avenue, Chevy Chase, MD, on the ground floor of the Willoughby Apartments – a short walk from the north entrance of the Friendship Heights metro stop on the red line. Street parking is limited, but valet parking is available at Alfio's. Dinner is at 6:30, the discussion begins at 7:30 and ends by 9.
